In connection with the Centenary Memorials and Extra-ordinary General Meeting of the Tararua Tramping Club recently decided to support a proposal for the creation of a National Park in the Tararua Range. A circular putting forward an alternative scheme was received from the Manawatu Tramping Club, stressing the importance from a natural history and science point of view of safeguarding the ranges in their natural condition. Although this Club had no direct interest in the Tararua territory an expression of opinion on the principles invloved was felt to be admissible, and after discussion the Committee decided unanimously to support the Manawatu Tramping Club's proposals. A Conference of Clubs operating in the Tararuas is to be held in Wellington at the end of January.

Private Trips

Stan Craven took a party of 14 High Scool Bovs from Kuripapanga to Puketitiri before Christmas under ideal weather conditions. After spending a night at the hut, they crossed the range to the Iron Whare on the second day, and descended the Makahu to Cook's Cottage on the third, opening up some usefull new tramping country in this area.

Mr. & Mrs Elder with two ex-Hereworth boys also made an end of term trip, crossing Rangi o te Atua to the Kawhatau Valley then ascending New Hikurangi, locating the ski-ing hut on the Ruahemi bush-line and returning to Hawke's Bay via Tiraha and Ctumore, coming out at Mr. Frank Severinsen's. Packs were kept down'to an average of 31 lbs.

Mr.& Mrs D.T.Christie, Leslie Matheson, Lattey & Piesse in spite of the poor weather conditions over the helidays made a successful nine-day trip from auripapanga to Taupo via Boyds Hut and Ngupuketurua (4977) reaching the lake at the Tauranga-Taupo. Reaching Boyd's Mut in two days, they spent a day there studying local fauna and climbing the crags of Tapui o Marua Nine. The divide to Ngapuketurua under the conditions of visibility gave some difficulty and the party spent a day traversing the head of the Rangitikei, but good tracks were picked up on the descent to the lake.

Geof Wilson (T.T.C.) Zotop (M.T.C.) Elder and von Dadelszen (H.T.C.) spent name days in the ranges north of Tarawera and Though the there loss of three days at the start owing to the difficulty of making progress in unknown country under bad weather conditions forced them to curtail the itinerary they followed the old survey route to rohokura (4528 ft) where a clear day gave a most opportune view of the whole area behind Waikaremoana. The main peaks lie in three groups of which the southernmost is isolated by the deep gorges of the Hautapu and Te Hoe Rivers so the trip was continued up the Hautapu to open country and ever a low saddae to the Rangitaiki. Game was not much in evidence, but Merinos were met with in the bush.

Ian Powell and Dick Clark spent three days in the headwaters of the Tukituki locating the route down from Hallett's Hut and acquiring some useful information about the area.

Hilary Fengall, Green, Joan Hall and Collinge, who joined a Hutt Valley Tramping Club party had a very fine lorry tour from Otira to the Franz Josef and Fox Glaciers, returning by Purakaiki and the Buller to Nelson where some of the party added a trip to Croiscelles and overland to Pelorous Sound. Three days were spent at the Franz Josef and two at the Fox, and they report that the weather was mostly fine.
