President's Report



#2113 Kaimanawa's 8-9 May 2010

A Party: A Friday eve departure meant it was a late arrival at the Kaimanawa Rd end but gave the needed option of an early start for our party. Dave H wisely decided to camp out, while the rest of us had a restless night in the truck. The 5 of our party rose at 5:30am and were on the track at within the hour. The sudden 600m or so climb through the forest to the open tops was a harsh wake up call. Some of the party spotted a kaka on a post nearing the tops. Initially it was quite misty but as we gained the next 200m to the high point it gradually cleared giving some mystical views along the tops. We met a party from Papamoa heading out, after an enjoyable night at Waipakahi Hut. It always seems a long haul across the Umukarikari Range but we'd done well to arrive at the hut by 11:00am for a welcome early lunch and brew up. We then headed on up the 500m climb to Junction top. David B had been experiencing bouts of cramp so he decided to return to the hut and Anne joined him, so that left just a party of 3 to venture off into untracked territory.

From the high point 1573 we could clearly see our route down a spur below us, across a saddle then a climb up onto Ngapukeahuanga. We were fortunate to find remnants of old hunters' or animal tracks periodically, along with shrubby thickets to push our way through. We had a welcome refuelling stop on Ngapuke. at 3;30pm and spent time choosing the best descent to Waimarino R and routes for the next day's exit. Thick forest and undergrowth made the descent more difficult, with relief of an occasional skimpy deer trail to follow.

After clinging to trees as anchors I was certainly glad to eventually reach the riverbed.

By 4:45pm we had set up camp and had a very comfortable shelter under Dave's new fly.

A pair of blue duck's were our rather allusive neighbours. Monique soon had a good fire glowing so we dined & rested in style.

Some slick packing meant we were away by 7:00am and headed across river to true left then up a gut to a spur beginning the planned exit route. Initially the beech forest was reasonably open so travel was easy but as we gained height the forest and undergrowth thickened and our progress was slow. Often it was made even more challenging by graveyards of trees uprooted by severe storms of seasons passed. It was impossible to get a visual fix on our position so David's compass bearings were carefully followed. Eventually we reached the clearing that was our first goal for a much needed break. Nearby, another clearing once used as a helicopter pad, aptly named Poxy!

We headed east back into the forest for a short period and then were pleased to burst out onto the clearing which would eventually led us up onto the tops. We lunched at 11:45am marvelling at our views through an unusually steely, grey light and the fact that there was NO wind. With the carbos stacked we conquered Ngapuketurua and were a little aghast at the 10K ahead to the Kiko Rd end. Would we ever make it by 5pm? We did-Bang On! Thanks Dave for an excellent trip and giving us the opportunity to go where, quite likely, no one has been before. Great to have Monique along.

#2115 Wanganui 21 - 23 May 2010

This trip came about as the result of a suggestion by David Scoullar of the Wanganui TC and was a great success. 18 of us stayed at the Top10 Holiday Park, clean, well appointed and on the riverbank. By morning the rain had stopped and it remained dry thereafter.

Day1: we travelled 40min on the River Rd to Atene Loop Track which follows a ridgeline around a now-dry meander of the river. After an initial climb over scrubby farmland to a viewpoint we walked in regenerating bush all day. Evidence of the very heavy goat infestation is everywhere and the track probably needs maintenance only to remove windfalls and repair slips, so browsed were the plants. After a leisurely lunch in the sun at a shelter we proceeded on to the truck, Geoff and showers followed by a pot luck dinner arranged by our hosts. This was held in a magnificent historic home in the late stages of a superb renovation by WTC club members Julie and Trevor Kearse. The meal was as excellent as the setting and the groups mingled freely. But all of us had done an 8hr tramp and most of them hadn't, so the need for sleep led to a relatively early strategic withdrawal by HTC.

Day 2. David had thoughtfully arranged a trip in the NW Tararuas, so that we were on our way home. The Sledge Track was re-opened recently as the result of great exertions by a team of volunteers with assistance from the local regional council. It starts on the banks of the Kahuterawa Stm which it follows in bush for a couple of km, then rising to a scrubby plateau, the site of platinum mines active about 100yr ago. These were home to some very attractive cave wetas with remarkable white lower legs. At least I thought they were attractive! The mines are on a loop of a couple of km and a feature of the vegetation is a profusion of small divaricating Coprosmas. Once again it was lunch in the sun, looking across to Taranaki and the central mountains as we chatted.

It was good to meet Glenda's brother Basil, about whose battles with DoC we have often heard, and Monty was able to reminisce at length with old school mates. Fancy Monty being an old boy of Wanganui Collegiate!

Geoff got us safely home without a coffee break and in spite of a rear tyre blowout. Fortunately it was not necessary to remove the tyre which was in fact due for replacement very soon anyway. Our grateful thanks to Geoff, to David and Juliet and others in WTC who made us so welcome. There are tentative plans for a reciprocal visit, probably based at Camp Wakarara which offers a good range of tramping options and is particularly good for less mobile members of both clubs.

#2117 Cattle Ridge – Tararua Forest Park

5-6 June 2010

It was Queen's Birthday weekend and the plan was to walk up to Cattle Ridge Hut for Saturday night and then along Cattle Ridge and over Bannister to Te Matawai Hut for the Sunday night, walking out to Poads Road on Monday. The forecast was not flash. We arrived at the Putara Road end in frosty but fine weather and headed off following the track up beside the Mangatainoka River. After only a few minutes those leading the charge spotted a deer disappearing up into the bush. There were a couple of swing bridges to cross within half an hour of the road-end before a 400m climb up to the Roaring Stag-Herepai track junction on the ridge at ref 139915. This ridge divides the Mangatainoka from the Ruamahanga River. After a quick refuelling stop we headed left down a long gentle ridge to the 12 bunk Roaring Stag Hut. It had taken 2hrs 50 from the road. We spent a leisurely hour for lunch soaking up the beautiful sunshine and contemplating the steep 700m climb ahead of us which looked rather daunting. Anne had negotiated with Jeff to lug her pack up to the top for a princely sum of \$300 however all bets were off when Jeff casually mentioned that he expected to have his tea cooked and waiting for him as part of the fee. While these negotiations were taking place and the rest of us were waiting for Scotty to beam us up, we were joined by 3 other good keen trampers who were heading to Cattle Ridge Hut that night as well, 2 of which decided to change plans and stay at Roaring Stag when they saw how many in our party and not knowing if there was any camping available at Cattle Ridge (well that was their excuse to get out of the climb!). We couldn't put it off much longer so donned our packs and headed off across the Ruamahanga River via a swing bridge and straight into the climb. The track takes you through beautiful bush before breaking out into subalpine scrub about half way up to the hut. The views from here on just got better and better and were well worth the slog. It was getting quite cool by the time we arrived at the 5 bunk Cattle Ridge Hut around 3ish. Not long after arriving the other hut occupant arrived with a sack pikau. This was Johnny, a very interesting character and friend of Murry's, and who had just spent the last 5 hours looking for a stash he had deposited close by but had got rather overgrown in the 2 years since his last visit. Johnny is a dairy farmer and was having a holiday while the cows were dry. He goes bush for 3 weeks or so at this time of the year and has several stashes throughout the Tararua's containing essential blankets, sleeping bags, tea, dry food and wotnot. He brings in some bacon, a few sausages and a pound of butter to start, supplementing this with eels and whatever he hunts. Johnny has an arrangement with his good wife whereby he phones her when he comes out of the bush, if something happens and she doesn't hear from him he doesn't want any search parties out looking and is content to pass away quietly in the ranges. Very nice sentiments to which I'm sure we could all relate to however being the practical person I am, I do hope Johnny has considered Mrs Johnny in all this and has his house in order so to speak and that she is not left up the proverbial creek without a paddle, financially, if this was to eventuate.

Sleeping arrangements were sorted, there were 8 of us all up, 5 bunks and very limited room outside for camping, a small possie in front of the hut just big enough for 1 tent. Jason was chomping at the bit to test his nice new Olympus so he and Jeff elected to bunk down outside for the night while Anne & Monty were going to top & tail inside with the rest of us. This organised and tent pitched there was still time to explore so Anne, Monty, Jeff & Monique climbed up onto Cattle Ridge for a nosey, reporting back that the weather did not look good on the other side, which is what we were dreading. There were still great views from the hut as night descended with the lights of Masterton twinkling in the distance. This wasn't going to last and sometime in the small hours the wind came followed by the rain. We heard David's watch alarm go off at the scheduled 6.00 o'clock. I knew the decision had been made not to continue when there was no rush of movement to get up and off. We finally got up and ventured a peek outside about 7ish to miserable conditions and poor visibility. There was no arm twisting required in the decision to return back out the way we had come in. Monty left a message on Geoff's phone advising the change of plans and just hoping that Sue's party wouldn't be too upset, we planned to be out between 3 & 4pm. We said our farewells to Johnny who was still tucked up in his bunk, he wasn't impressed with this tramping club business, carrying the

weight we did and thought we'd all make pretty good farmers if we enjoyed going out in these conditions...LOL. The trek down to Roaring Stag hut was a little slippery in places but didn't take too long at all. We spent a good couple of hours at the hut, which was surprisingly full, as we didn't want to get out to the road too early, all the while watching the Ruamahanga River slowly rising. It was still raining as we headed back out to the road end with the track down now flowing quite well with the Mangatainoka and side streams in flood. It was a welcome sight to see the truck and hot water on the boil. Many thanks to Geoff. After a quick change into warm dry clothes and a brew we were on our way back home with a coffee stop at BP Dannevirke.

Logging Trucks on Makahu Road into Puketitiri Hot Springs.

Logging trucks on Makahu Road have been operating all year will be until into early next year. Expect to meet them any hour any day, wet, fine, hail or snow. They are using truck and trailer units - quite massive articulated things, however the logs appear shorter than average, quite stumpy and of average girth. "Logging truck" notices are clearly posted along by Balls Clearing and probably further out also. The area of harvest is in Makahu Road, somewhere around the old Middle Hill track entrance and a bit beyond.

Harvesting methods are creating a history making "first," using specialised winching gear, it all featured in a very well supported successful Field Day seminar a few months back. These are Pinus trees Jack Nicholas hand planted soon after he got Makahu, with his wise vision for the future. Expected crop yield is 38 - 40,000 tonnes, enough to make quite a few boxes of matches.

Pam's experience is that the drivers are super well trained courteous guys, helpful and safe. It's the other idiot road users who are the dangerous ones. Most crashes now happen just north of Ball's Clearing, along our farm boundary fence, where the tar-sealing ends and the idiots can't handle the shingle! Yes, three cheers for sealing the Puketitiri Road - but all it has done, is extend the crash zone further along to where the sealing ends.

My advice is - Don't attempt the road at present unless you are competent at reversing; obviously the logging trucks can't and drive to the conditions.

The Makahu Ford is taking a hammering, made worse by all the higher than usual water levels and it will be interesting to see if the Regional Council will come up with maintenance for that.

From the Archives 50 Years Ago

1960 Snow Trip

16 June 1960

Twelve bodies left Holt's at 6.40 a.m. for the Waipawa River. We arrived safely and finally got away at 9.30 - a very poor effort but, considering the fact that Saturday night was the First Test in South Africa, it wasn't too bad.

We dragged off upstream to the foot of the bush patch where we changed socks, donned longs, boiled the billy (on a <u>primus</u>) and had lunch. Getting a bit soft these days so we had a primus along instead of hunting for wood!

Eventually twelve somewhat decrepit bodies crawled onto the saddle and thence up the slopes to 67 in the mist. Visibility about 4/5 of $\frac{5}{8}$ of not very much. Finally all assembled on top of 67 and tried to find a special spot we had picked out for glissading.

Some of the more daring types picked out a nice steep place and broke a run through the ice cap to the soft snow underneath. Then the fun began, with bodies scattered all over various slopes doing all manner of odd glissades except the correct standing one. It was odd to see bodies doing handsprings, backward somersaults, tandem, double-decker and trains of up to nine bodies all gaily screaming down the slopes to end up in heaps of snow-covered, mangled humanity at the bottom. It was quite a spectacle but one had to move quickly to avoid being bowled by the next madman when all bodies had migrated to one slope.

When it got to about 3 o'clock and everyone was feeling somewhat subdued and wet, we left the top and burled off down to the saddle, down through the bush, off longs, up packs and headed for the truck which we reached at dark. Out to Cullins it was slip, slide and bump as the track was really wet and greasy. Then home, arriving in Hastings at about 8 p.m. after a quite enjoyable trip. The first snow trip of the season.

ARE YOU FIT ENOUGH TO TRAMP?

Even the easiest of club trips requires a reasonable degree of fitness and, from time to time, tramps have been seriously delayed by unfit party members. While individuals may have varying degrees of basic fitness it is unlikely that a person who has a sedentary job or who plays no sport will manage an average B Party trip. The best preparation for tramping is tramping and there are hilly places in Napier and close to Hastings which make excellent training areas. For example, a walk from the cattle-stop car park in Te Mata Park to the top of the peak via the big redwoods, and back to the cattle-stop via the roadside track with an 8 kg pack should take about 70-80 minutes. Further, this pace should be able to be maintained for five to six hours.

TRIP GRADINGS

EASY:

4-6 hours tramping - suitable for beginners.

MEDIUM: HARD:

6-8 hours tramping - suitable for those with some experience. 7 hrs+ tramping - experience & a high level of fitness necessary.

Unless otherwise specified an "A" trip would have a HARD grading and a "B" trip a MEDIUM grading.

TRUCK MATTRESS AIRING SYSTEM

This is to overcome occasional problems of damp mattresses. It is a bit like an inverted toast-rack & keeps the mattresses about 90mm apart from each other to allow air circulation & drying.

- 1. BEFORE MOVING ANYTHING, ALL GO INSIDE THE TRUCK, and have a good look at the system, so that you ALL know how to put it back as found, after your trip.
- 2. Dismantle with care, put mattresses aside, and stow components as below.
- 3. The fibreboard spacers all fit ON EDGE on the two black steel brackets above the book-rack. If properly stowed, they will not fall off, even on the roughest road!
- 4. The two timber cross-members stow fore-and-aft, screw-side down, on the two black steel brackets at RH side, just below the blanket-rack. They may need a little bit of firm pressure to engage on brackets, meant to be that way. Likewise, they will not fall off if properly stowed.
- 5. Lay mattresses as normal.
- 6. The above procedure is completely reversible and is to be done!
