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# **President's Report**

In my last report I mused about the state of tramping in the 21st century and possible futures for tramping clubs. Some recent issues of *Wilderness* magazine have also explored this theme and it is interesting to read that, in some parts of New Zealand, people can now find shorter tramping activities that are organised through the internet. Overseas visitors and people on tight schedules find this method very useful as they can take part in tramps at very short notice without the need to find a club outlet and fit in with its timetable. Many people may also be uninterested in the responsibilities and commitment needed to be part of established clubs and have developed this version of tramping that suits them.

Of course there is a counter-argument that says clubs are the places to go to for safety reasons, and also to gain training and experience in order to tackle more demanding tramps. Also, in many cases costs can be lowered by sharing with other club members such things as transport, equipment and accommodation. It is probable that both forms of organisation have their place these days – although HTC is organised along fairly traditional lines it is good to see a steady inflow of new members over the last few months and I hope they will continue their association with us.

One of the advantages of clubs is the social interaction between members. Here in the HTC many lifelong friendships have been forged (as well as marriages and other close relationships) and, in my opinion, is what gives the club a highly supportive environment that we all value. Recently we marked the death of life member Jackie Smith after a long illness and, as we go to print, we are saddened to receive news of the death of Shirley Bathgate – tributes to both appear later in this issue. On a more joyous note we were all delighted to receive news of the birth of Anne and David Blake's daughter, Keri – congratulations to you two.

#2145 Mount Kahuranaki

Wed 13 April 2011

#2146 Whirinaki Forest Park @ Easter Weekend

22 - 25 April 2011

A Party: Okahu Roadend to Mangakahika Hut to Moerangi Hut and River Road

A full truck pulled up at the end of Okahu Road after having to travel the long way round (4½ hrs) via Taupo because the Pohokura Road entrance bridge was out. Our party of eight headed off in light drizzle down the wide, easy track. At Skips Hut we stopped for an early lunch, enjoying the usual misty Whirinaki conditions. When the B party soon caught us up we moseyed back onto the track and up the easy saddle over to Rogers Hut where we admired the historic building complete with stained glass window. From Rogers we left the mountain bike-motorway track to enjoy the river winding below us, a couple of whio ducking in the rapids, and the majestic forest with its ferny under-storey. It was still drizzling when we arrived at Mangakahika Hut at 4.30, six hours all up.

That evening we had a good discussion about the next day, the possible routes over the high point, Maungataniwha, and how to avoid leatherwood on the top. The next morning was still cloudy but the mist seemed to be a little higher up. There was a check to see whether the party wanted to push on or not and the majority was keen. We headed up the stream behind the hut which had had a major flood down it a few years back, leaving tree trunk laden shelves and mounds. At the first fork, 34 km from the hut, we looked up the ridge we were to take. It would be off-track from here, all the way to Te Waiotukapiti Hut with some tricky navigation required. The ridge went straight up - hmmmm, nothing ventured, nothing gained - four wheel drive engaged, scrabbling away up over steep roots and moss. Monique soon took the lead, displaying her "tree monkey" prowess (she's an arborist). Bluffy bits appeared above us and we climbed up them until we got to one tricky bluff where for about 10 metres I was just hanging on to moss with my hands and trying to put my feet on any tufty bit of grass. The adrenalin was pumping - with the top in sight I thought, "Feasible to get up but I'd hate to reverse this; potentially a bit dangerous," and let out a large sigh of relief when we were all safely there. The last ones up were left with hardly any footholds. The difficulty eased off and we stopped to regroup. David said he'd been stung multiple times in some tender areas by wasps after the people in front had disturbed a nest! He seemed to be okay so we clambered up the next steep sections using trees as ladders. After another 20 minutes of toil we were strung out a bit and there was a call from behind to come back. We found that David was reacting badly to the stings and said he was feeling woozy. He'd taken antihistamine tablets and we fished out some antihistamine cream to rub on. He sensibly handed over leadership and we started heading back down. It was three hours since we'd left the hut and we'd gone about 3km. I was anxiously examining the map trying to see if there could be another way down as none of us fancied the bluffs. We'd been heading down for about half an hour, sticking closely together and David seemed to be managing, when Monique said, "I can see the stream down through the trees". A quick check of the compass and - oops - at the last knoll we'd mistakenly dropped off the main ridge on the south side! The way to the stream looked steep but feasible. Fifteen minutes later we were all in the creek and it didn't take long to descend back down the creek to the hut.

David was feeling pretty ill but didn't need to be evacuated. A few minutes later the B party walked into view and we all had lunch together and discussed options. We decided to head back down to Rogers Hut as a big group. Once we got to Rogers, David was gradually improving but decided to stay there with Debbie and the B party while the rest of us followed the mountain bike track north to Moerangi Hut. It was drizzling on and off and we were thankful for the easy-to-follow, bulldozed track as the light gradually faded. We walked the last hour with head torches – all up, I think we took about 2 ½ hours. The hut was empty but had hardly any firewood. We settled in for the night and the next morning we had a leisurely start in order to collect a good supply of wood. The easy mountain bike track continued into a heavily trapped area where the tui, bellbirds and kaka were raucous. The mountain bike track was getting to be a bit of a plod so it was suggested we take a long-cut by heading down to the Mangamate Stream. We lunched at the stream before getting wet boots and joining the main Whirinaki River track. Having thought we had plenty of time - with

my estimate of the long cut only adding half an hour - it turned out more like an hour and we started to worry about being late for our rendezvous with the truck. Greg (bless his young legs) took off like a hare into the distance to placate any impatience at the car park. We all marched into the River Road carpark bang on 2p.m. (our meeting time) and five minutes later the truck rolled in. Perfect....all aboard and all well! Off to the culinary delights of the Taupo Stag Diner truck stop where Jason helped out behind the counter to satisfy the burger-eating HTC hogs.

Thanks to David H for planning such an adventurous trip - I hope we make it next time - to the rest of the party for their great company and to David B for safely driving us such a long way.

#### #2148 **Herricks to Dead Dog Hut**

22 May 2011

We left Hastings at 6.30 on Sunday morning and made our way westwards past Maraekakaho to the private farm road through Thorn Flat, arriving at the bush edge beside Herricks Hut around eight. After booting-up and drinking tea we all ambled off to Herricks where we left Pam and Helen who planned to spend the day exploring nearby. The rest of us started on the sidle track that leads to Dead Dog Stream. This track is well maintained by DoC and passes through good stands of kanuka, some of which have diameters of 40 cm or more. Every now and then green hooded orchids were spied beside the track while, overhead, kereru, tomtits and heard some and other common bush birds were seen

The stream was reached at around 10 o'clock, clear but flowing a little higher than I had hoped. From this point to Dead Dog Hut the stream path, as depicted on the map, resembles a large U. Numerous stream crossings were made as we headed upstream and, after 80 minutes walking and only half-way around the U bend at a particularly deep crossing with a number of the party feeling the cold (or too numb to feel anything), we stopped for a confab. It was decided that five of the party would return back to Herrick's while another three plus the four-person A party ahead of us would continue on upstream to the hut. Stream travel was found to be considerably easier past this point and we were also able to find a number of overland routes that avoided some stretches of the stream. We had lunch at a lovely sunny spot almost opposite the hut at 12.15 and then went over to the cold shade on the other side of the creek to inspect the hut itself.

# #2150 Northern Kaweka – Queens Birthday Weekend

4 - 6 June

A Party: The weekend got off to an early start with a few hardy soles gathering pre-dawn at Lex Smith's residence in Havelock North. The sky was dark as we packed into the truck with those awake enough to talk quickly focusing on the long weekend's dicey weather forecast.

After pick-ups in Taradale and an uneventful drive, we arrived at The Gums on Makahu Road, said goodbye to the B party and set off up the steep track then an undulating climb past an old biv toward Makino Hut. A quick lunch was had there before descending down to the Makino River, across the three-wire bridge and the start of the long steady climb of 750 m to Mangaturutu Hut. The gradient of the climb proved too much for the heels of one of the members who quickly exchanged his relatively new stiff boots for the greater flexibility afforded by shoes. However the damage was already done and the tender heels were well blistered and worn.

Although the weather had managed to hold, with only a few light showers, the wind was picking up with increased gusto and cooler temperatures as the afternoon wore on. With progress to Mangaturutu Hut behind schedule, bodies exhausted, daylight quickly fading and the weather closing in, it was decision time. The group got together, talked through the options and made the joint decision to push on to Te Pukeohikarua Hut. The three-hour journey was really one of two halves: the first half in fading sunlight passed relatively quickly with easy travel, rested legs and renewed enthusiasm. The onset of darkness, combined with strong winds, heavy rain and varying terrain proved much more challenging. Te Puke Hut was reached after 7p.m. and was a welcome end to a tough first day. Upon arrival at the hut, Monique assumed responsibility for lighting the small stove, wet clothes were quickly shed, and brews and hot meals gratefully consumed. Six tired trampers hit the sack, listening to the familiar sounds of heavy rainfall on a tin roof and wind buffeting at the door while dreaming of waking up to receding river levels and glorious sunshine.

The next morning didn't bring bright sunshine but it did bring the opportunity to re-assess our plans. The original trip scheme had us bush-bashing south toward a point named Ngakawekaiti, down to Omarukokere Biv and up along a spur to Venison Tops and Kelvinator (Tira) Lodge. David, Anne and John went ahead to check out the travel while Deb, Monique and Greg stayed at the hut. Due to the rigors of the previous day, the sorry state of knees and feet and heavy overnight rainfall, the decision was made to abandon the day's bush-bashing and instead to make our way to Tira Lodge by the more conventional tracked mode of travel. This saw us back-tracking to Mangaturutu Hut for a leisurely lunch and then an easy down and up to Vension Tops. Afternoon saw the sun shining, pain receding and the day's travel completed by midafternoon. After a brilliant time spent exploring Venison Tops and reading the FMC Bulletin in the sun, it was considered that maybe the hut's moniker was perhaps a little undeserved.

The final day back out to Makahu Road was going to be a long one. After a hearty breakfast and some creative heel bandaging, courtesy of Anne, we were away by 8a.m. for an initial steady descent then easy flat travel before steeply rising again up out of the bush line towards Whetu which stands at 1650m. The morning's weather had started out clear but, as soon as we ventured onto the tops, the wind picked up and blew in a wet, misty clag. Views were obstructed as we made our way eastward down Camp Spur to lunch at Middle Hill Hut. Having made surprisingly good time for the morning, a good rest was had at Middle Hill before the final easy one and a half hour journey out to the waiting truck at Makahu Roadend.

Although the main objective of the tramp was not realised, it was a good trip nonetheless and a good introduction into the varied terrain of the Kaweka FP.

#2153 Howletts Hut 2 – 3 July 2011

Nine started from our carefully chosen park on Kashmir Road via the overland route on a day that was not yet sure whether it should be the tail-end of the passing front weather or a clear day. Anyway, it was kind to give us only drizzle on and off! David Mulinder and his team of three from Dannevirke met us at the track start and, by the time we had reached the Longview-Daphne ridge junction, the original B duo and the Dannevirke crew were of the opinion that Daphne Hut should now be the goal for the day. The now seven-member A party trudged on down to the Tukituki at a fair pace and snacked at the river, the reason being it may be better to do so with warm dry happy feet than the opposite near Daphne! The river was very cold and, on reaching Daphne, most unbooted and wrung out socks before the 800m climb to Howletts. The tops were obscured in fog/cloud all day so no views but had cleared by the time we exited the bushline.

The last of us arrived at about 4pm to a warming hut (new fire box) made by the fast lot who got there earlier and had a relaxing time with no hurry to get dinner going. From just above the bushline it was continuous snow so there was the desire to warm and dry boots for the snow travel tomorrow! The tops, Tiraha and Sawtooth Ridge were gleaming in a fresh white coat and looked inviting – but will have to wait for another day! The temperature at 6pm was minus 3°C so a primus was needed to heat up the frozen tap. We were all in bed by about 7pm and dozing (with interesting noises from some!) when at about 8pm a headlamp appeared through the door followed by four people. As we and a solo guy from Dannevirke were the only tenants, there was space for all.

I asked them if they had tents and the answer was no – a bit risky? Keep an eye out for the axe if you are up there; her phone number is in the hut log book. We got away at 9am and took about four hours to get to the Longview Hut turnoff. Through the vegetation patches the snow was softer and travel was good but on the open tops it was very icy indeed in places so the axes came out. Cool was the day at about 3°C and a 20-30km wind from the west so there was about a minus five degree wind-chill. On the way I spent a little time on ice-axe arrest practice for the ones needing it.

The B party had decided to come from the junction on the Daphne overland track to take the ridge along to Longview. We met up at the hut sign, chatted and moved off down to the truck which Dave Heaps had shifted to the road end car-park for us — was great to have Ed and Dave out and I caught up on a million things. Thanks to Dave for the driving at the last minute. One thing that was absent was bird song, hardly any heard in two days! Very lucky with the weather for the Sunday along the alpine tops; it was just what we wanted and what the forecast said too!

Kinloch to Kawakawa Bay (Sat)

# **Private Tramping Trips**

## Ahipaepae - Kaimanawa Forest Park

27 - 28 Nov 2010

From here we followed the track up along the Hinemaiaia Stream, crossed the swingbridge (not marked on the Topo50 map) and continued beside the stream in nice beech forest. We headed WNW along the ridge, dropping into a saddle and up the other side to the junction of two ridges. Up to that stage bush travel was excellent with very little undergrowth. Here, we headed NNW into the head of Tiraki Stream and sidled it downhill for a couple of kilometres before we made camp. Lots of sika deer are in the area.

After a mild night, another fine hot day and we set off down the Tiraki Stream with open silver and red beech forest, and easy travel. A couple of hours later we came across an established but deserted hunters' camp. Here we followed a good cut track down on the true left of the stream and, a little while later, stopped at DoC's Tiraki helipad. A short distance further downstream, where a large side stream comes in from the true right, we climbed NE on to a broad spur and followed up to the 800m contour. Here, on a bearing of 55 degrees, it was a matter of walking in a straight line of three kilometers along a flank of a ridge back to the road end. Bush travel was good all the way. Back in the ute and five minutes down the road the rain came down so that was good timing.

# 7 Oct 1939 - 6 May 2011

Jackie joined HTC in the 1960s and was a hardy little tramper. We shared many hours of friendship along bush and mountain trails. Snow fights, water fights, camaraderie in outback huts - Jackie contributed to them all. On a personal note, Jackie and I took up fencing – no, not the building of barricades around paddocks but the spear-poking, martial arts combat type of fencing. Being somewhat vertically challenged, Jackie did not have the traditional stature of a fencer but her determination, deftness and skill made her a winner. Women were supposed to fence using foils only but one night, when competition was a bit dull, we stole the men's prized sabres: big, heavy, REAL weapons. With my height all I could do was slash around over Jackie's head while she scored many bulls-eyes on me, much lower down and well out of the legal target zone! That was quite a battle, which saw both of us nearly expelled from that club!

Jackie supported HTC working parties to the full, always the first to arrive and the last to leave. Be it picking sweet corn, harvesting pumpkins, digging potatoes or pulling pine-trees, she would head the telephone tree, ringing members to ask, "Are you coming......why not?? I'll see you there." We could not escape with feeble excuses. In her professional Post Office position Jackie was invaluable, instantly knowing changes of addresses and who was where. Her fellow workers would vouch for her meticulous work habits and her cheerfulness. She would tootle all over town in her little VW, hand-delivering Pohokuras.

Jackie was HTC Treasurer for TWENTY-THREE years, a stunning achievement. She performed her duties quietly and methodically, and her books were a picture of accuracy. Former President, Alan Berry said how much he relied on Jackie's accuracy and what a pleasure it was to work alongside her. For her outstanding services to HTC Jackie was justly awarded Life Membership of HTC. This world needs many more Jackies. Pam Turner

# **Obituary: SHIRLEY M H BATHGATE-HUNT (Petals)**

1925 - 2011

Tramping Clubs would not be complete without members who could best be described as *characters*; people who are renowned perhaps for forcefully expressed opinions or maybe for adherence to traditional aspects of tramping technology or even quirky standards of outdoor attire. They may have the ability to spin yarns or sing ballads or maybe even something as wonderful as making a fire in a downpour. Whatever their idiosyncrasies these people are vividly remembered long after they have gone and Shirley is certainly one of them. For some years she has been the oldest actively-involved member of HTC with many years service on the committee to her credit and a special responsibility for the club's photo albums.

Petals came from a tramping family – her father, Dr D A Bathgate, was one of the founders of HTC and she often spoke of trips with him and with her brothers when she was young, most memorably with pack horses over Ngamatea. She later moved away from Hawke's Bay for her nursing career then marriage and family but kept up her tramping interests with other clubs in Manawatu and Southland. From her return to the Bay in the mid-1980s, Shirley was very active within HTC and went out on many trips. She became the club's most vocal environmental spokesperson, speaking out loudly when she felt that New Zealand's natural heritage was being compromised by governmental or overseas mis-management. Many politicians came to feel her wrath through numerous letters that questioned their policies.

In HTC Petals was a good friend to many of us. She loved the social side of the club and gave lavish dinner parties over the years. Her mini-mince pies were famous throughout the Antipodes and her snoring was second to none! She insisted on civil behaviour at all times and any transgressions were likely to be met with a stern, "Watch it, you!" Despite recent health problems which sapped her energies she still contributed to the club whenever she could. Happy Tramping, Petals – we will miss you very much. Christine Hardie

#### ARE YOU FIT ENOUGH TO TRAMP?

Even the easiest of club trips requires a reasonable degree of fitness and, from time to time, tramps have been seriously delayed by unfit party members. While individuals may have varying degrees of basic fitness it is unlikely that a person who has a sedentary job or who plays no sport will manage an average B Party trip. The best preparation for tramping is tramping and there are hilly places in Napier and close to Hastings which make excellent training areas. For example, a walk from the cattle-stop car park in Te Mata Park to the top of the peak via the big redwoods and back to the cattle-stop via the roadside track with an eight kg pack should take about 70 - 80 minutes. Further, this pace should be able to be maintained for five to six hours.

#### TRIP GRADINGS

EASY:

4 - 6 hours tramping; suitable for beginners.

MEDIUM:

6 - 8 hours tramping; suitable for those with some experience.

HARD:

7 hrs+ tramping; experience and a high level of fitness necessary.

Unless otherwise specified an "A" trip would have a HARD grading and a "B" trip a MEDIUM grading.
